

His journey within the criminal system commenced at the tender age of 13, leading him to spend just under 6 years behind bars across 11 prisons spanning the UK, including **HMP Cookham Wood, HMP Feltham, HMP Isis, HMP Pentonville** and **HMP Thameside**.

Having navigated the criminal justice landscape since his youth, his profound understanding and experience within this system are both vast and insightful.

WHAT WE DO



Our workshops educate young people on the criminal justice system through seven modules. The **"Before You Commit"** programme covers the consequences of **crime**, **incarceration**, **release**, **and mental health impacts**.

By offering **unfiltered content,** it aims to prevent crime and help youth understand the system's impact without firsthand experience. Guest speakers, including justice system workers, former inmates, and affected families, provide diverse viewpoints on the **hidden consequences of criminal activity**.

We do this with 3 key areas in mind:

- **1. Planting The Seed of Doubt**
- 2. Education and Awareness
- **3. Alternative Pathways and Role Models**

THE NEED

Amid London's escalating youth crime crisis, statistics unveil a pressing reality: an **18% uptick in youth homicides** and a **40% surge in knife crime affecting teenagers.**

What's more alarming is the youth's limited awareness only **22% comprehend crime consequences, and 68% believe there are none.** Beyond figures, it's a generation navigating peril with insufficient understanding. A hopeful sign arises in an educational workshop on the criminal justice system.

Stop and searches of children increased by 13% compared to the previous year while remaining at the same level for adults and the children accounted for just over one in five stop and searches where age was known, increasing by two percentage points from the previous year. Arrests of children increased by 9%, whereas there was just a 2% increase for adults.

In the year ending March 2023, there were around **107,800 stop and searches of children.** This was an increase of 13% compared with the previous year while stop and searches of people aged 18 and over remained static. The number of stop and searches involving children as a proportion of overall stop and searches where age was known has increased by two percentage points in each of the last two years, rising from 17% in the year ending March 2021 to 19% last year and 21% in the latest year.

ONDON CRIME STATISTICS



The percentage of murder increase in 2021 compared to the previous year and by 20% when compared to the pre-COVID period. In 2023, 16 of the 80 murder victims in London were teenagers.



The percentage increase of knife crime involving teenage victims in London to 5,332 in 2019, before the coronavirus pandemic began, from 3,809 in 2012.



Over half of all teenage homicides in the last 3 years had links to gangs as gang violence spreads across London affecting more young people.

Khadys Dream IMPACT REPORT DEMOGRAPHICS


As part of the workshop at Khadys Dream we surveyed **200 participants** before and after the workshop was completed.

The data that will be acquired during the survey will allow us to **understand different aspects of young people's lives** and interaction with the law at any point in their lives.

Along with how the workshop impacts on how they understand different aspects of what we offer within the workshop and how much it **increased their knowledge.**


DEMOGRAPHICS -WORKSHOP AGE RANGES

Most of the young people that we worked with were within the 16-18 age range (sixth form) with them making up close to 38% of the young people who attended the workshop, the 13-15 age range (Statutory school - GCSE age) came a close second with made up about 27.5% of those young people who attended the workshop.




DEMOGRAPHICS -GENDER

When looking at gender, we have close to 75% of young people who attended the workshop as being Male with just above 25% being Female.



DEMOGRAPHICS -ETHNICITY

When it comes to ethnicity the highest proportion of young people that attended the workshop were of White Ethnicity (28.2%), with the Black and Mixed closely following up with just above 23%.



Khadys Dream IMPACT REPORT PRE-QUESTIONNAIRE

Before the workshop, we gave participants a questionnaire to assess their knowledge.

Approximately **4% had been in a YOI/prison**, and most were unaware of what prison life entails. About 31% knew what a sentencing guideline is, and 30% were aware of the different prison categories. Regarding having a solicitor during a police interview, 46% didn't know, just under 40% said yes, and 15% said no.

When asked how long they would serve in prison for £250,000, responses were: 33% said no time, 27% said 6 months, 13.5% said 5 years, nearly 10% said 1 year, and the rest chose 1-2 years, 3 years, or 4 years.

On attending a family member's funeral while in prison, 14% thought they could always attend, 23% thought they couldn't, and just under 63% said it would depend on the situation.

Participants had a skewed view of prison life, with just over 50% believing it sometimes looked cool, 27% always thought it looked cool, and just under 22% said it didn't. **This perception was influenced by their sources of information:** 46% from social media, 10% from music/music videos, and 23% from word of mouth. Additionally, 82% focused on the appealing aspects of a criminal lifestyle, like clothes and cash, while only 18% noted the mental health issues and stress.

We asked participants - To find Risks associate with crime and the criminal justice system - where would you look and received the following answers – 28.5% would look to Google, 25% would look to what they see on Social Media, 23.5% feel workshops would give them the best answers, 11% would ask friends or family with the rest of the participants being unsure where to look (11%).



Khadys Dream IMPACT REPORT POST-QUESTIONNAIRE

We hand out a Questionnaire after the workshop has completed looking at how much information the young people have learnt once they have completed the workshop. Questions involved how they felt the group went and information on whether they would recommend it to others. 100% of those who attended the workshop would recommend it to family and friends.



37% benefited most from the Group Discussions, 27% felt it was from the videos and 15% felt it was from the photos.

Over 89% of participants engaged well enough to give the workshops a rating over 8, with 48% giving it 10.

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BEFORE YOU COMMIT

The workshop project educates youth on the **criminal justice system**, **prison life**, **and reintegration into society** to deter criminal activity. It covers arrest and sentencing, the realities of prison life, the ripple effects on family and community, and mental health impacts. The program also addresses post-release challenges and long-term consequences of a criminal record. By providing this knowledge, the workshops aim to promote **informed decision-making and highlight the severe repercussions of criminal actions**, while presenting alternative life paths and ongoing support through the Khadys Dream platform.

In July 2022, Kevin was in HMP High Down on a Zoom call with his probation worker, who informed him that he would not be given his HDC

During this call, he was introduced to Jayde from the Evolve team



Upon release, Kevin envisioned showing young people how he wasted six years of his life due to poor decisions and highlighting the hidden challenges he faced, such as being placed back into the same hostel and his mother suffering



Jayde used his personal experience from starting his own businesses, along with his relatable and authentic approach, to bond with Kevin and gain his trust



With years of experience working with young people, Jayde understood Kevin's passion and was able to create a trusting space. Kevin had no qualifications, having been in the criminal justice system since the age of 13



Jayde motivated Kevin to attend workshops and courses on business planning, building his confidence to apply for his first grant with Camden Giving.



Combining Jayde's expertise with at-risk youth and Kevin's lived experience, they created Khadys Dream. This blend of experience and professionalism transformed Kevin's frustration from years in prison into a determination to develop business skills and start Khadys Dream.
